'Beyond Growth?'

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SYNPOSIS

There is an burgeoning popular literature on the impending collapse of the neoliberal capitalist model, much of it brought about by the world running out of resources (land, water, oil) or destroying its own life-support system (climate, biodiversity). This seminar provides an opportunity for participants to read carefully and thoughtfully one chosen sample from the literature and to assess its intellectual merits.

The core task within the seminar is to compose a high-quality academic book review. In practice, this means that every participant will read, in its entirety, one of books listed below. Without exception, these books deal with environmental collapse, de-growth, zero-growth, post-growth, or some such. Upon reading and upon consulting additional sources, the student will write and present a research paper on the book, reviewing and critiquing the assigned reading. Reviewing means (i) summarizing and (ii) contextualizing the key points of the reading's argument so as to make its content understandable to a person who has not studied the reading. Critiquing means engaging with the substance of the reading's argument, assessing the quality of its logical consistency, coherence, or empirical factuality.

PREREQUISITES

This is an undergraduate level seminar that requires knowledge of undergraduate-level micro, macro, math, and statistics.

ASSESSMENT

Your performance will be evaluated based on the following assignments:

- 1. A research paper ("Seminararbeit"), which is your written book review. Maximum length: 4000 words. Weight: 50 percent.
- 2. A seminar presentation. Duration: 20 minutes. Weight: 30 percent.
- 3. A written referee report constructively critiquing the research paper of a fellow participating student and 3 minute presentation thereof. Maximum length: 1000 words. Weight: 20 percent

While not perfect, it provides a first glimpse of what a good book review does and how it does it. Looking at additional book reviews will help to get a better understanding of what a *high quality* book review should entail.
