Under National Socialist rule, hundreds of thousands of Sinti and Roma were persecuted and murdered in Germany and other European countries. The aim of the Nazi state and its racial ideology was the Europe-wide extermination of the minority. The pioneering international project presented here brings together the scattered knowledge about the National Socialist genocide in its European dimension in a large-scale encyclopaedia. More than 80 academics from Germany and abroad are currently working on the project, which is funded by the German Federal Foreign Office. With the launch, the encyclopaedia, which is being created in German and English in cooperation with the Centre for Digital Systems at Freie Universität Berlin, will be accessible online for the first time. It will grow to around 1,000 specialist articles by the end of 2025 and represent a milestone for research and educational work on the Nazi genocide of the Sinti and Roma in Europe.

Karola Fings is head of the project "Encyclopaedia of the Nazi Genocide of the Sinti and Roma in Europe" at the Research Centre on Antigypsyism in Heidelberg. She has published numerous works on the Nazi persecution of Sinti and Roma.

Michael Wildt is a retired professor of German history in the 20th century with a focus on National Socialism at Humboldt University in Berlin and a member of the academic advisory board of the encyclopaedia project.

Jane Weiß is a consultant for community-based historical-political education at the Federal Agency for Civic Education and a private lecturer at Humboldt University in Berlin. She is a member of the academic advisory board of the encyclopaedia project.
